This accreditation report is issued by the Hong Kong Council for Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications (HKCAAVQ) in its capacity as the Accreditation Authority as provided for under the Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications Ordinance (Cap 592) (AAVQO). This report outlines the HKCAAVQ's determination, the validity period of the determination as well as any conditions or restrictions on the determination.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 Centennial College was established by The University of Hong Kong (HKU) as an independent college to offer self-financed degree programmes. The College went through HKCAAVQ's Institutional Review in March 2011 and was registered as a post-secondary college under the Post Secondary Colleges Ordinance (Cap 320) in 2012. The accreditation status of its bachelor degree programmes is subject to the approval of the Chief-Executive-in-Council.
- 1.2 The College commissioned HKCAAVQ to re-accredit its Bachelor of Arts (Honours) Programme (BA) and the Bachelor of Professional Accounting (Honours) Programme (BPAcc), and to conduct accreditation for a new learning programme Bachelor of Social Sciences (Honours) (BSocSc).
- 1.3 The accreditation exercise was conducted according to the relevant accreditation guidelines referred to in the Service Agreement and the Terms of Reference stated therein. A site visit took place from 29 November to 2 December 2016.

2. HKCAAVQ's Accreditation Determination

Having due consideration of the accreditation panel's observations and comments as presented in this Report, HKCAAVQ makes the following accreditation determinations:

2.1.1 Requirements

BSocSc and BA

- (a) The College is to demonstrate the effectiveness of monitoring the marking and grading of assessments in BSocSc and BA to ensure that they are criteria-based and standards-referenced and that the policy is applied consistently within the College.

The College is to submit a report, including the related evidence, to HKCAAVQ for the fulfilment of the above requirement **on or before 1 March 2018**.

BSocSc, BA and BPAcc

- (b) The College is to provide an annual report to HKCAAVQ on **1 March each year of the validity period** regarding the security of tenure of the teaching venue. The information to be provided includes but is not limited to the following:
- (i) an update on the status of the College's Island South (Pokfulam) campus as a teaching venue of the three Programmes;
 - (ii) a report on the number of new students as well as the total number of students in each of the three Programmes, together with the related financial information at programme level; and
 - (iii) up-to-date physical and financial resource plans for the remaining years of the validity period with reference to (a) and (b) above to assure HKCAAVQ that a satisfactory learning environment will be provided for the delivery of the three Programmes.

2.1.2 Recommendations

BSocSc, BA and BPAcc

- (a) The College should introduce Putonghua course(s) to enable students to communicate using multiple languages as stated in PILO-1.
- (b) The College should formulate clear guidelines with regard to developing students' critical thinking skills to ensure a consistent understanding of it among teaching staff and provide integrated training in it for staff throughout the Programmes.

BPAcc

- (c) The College should engage in regular review of the POs and PILOs in a proactive manner to ensure they remain relevant for the future.
- (d) The College should review the grading policy of Accounting Internship to ensure students' efforts and performance are fairly reflected in their degree awards.

3. Programme Details

The following programme information is provided by the operator.

3.1 Programme Objectives

BSocSc

- BSocSc aims to provide students with basic education in various social sciences disciplines, enhancing students' ability to understand social sciences theories and concepts and their applications. The Programme emphasises inter-disciplinary perspectives in the study of contemporary issues and the interplay of social, political, economic and historical factors leading to various social issues and crises.

BA

- BA aims to provide academic opportunities for purposeful learning that fosters critical and integrative thinking across conventional boundaries, creative synergy of cultural and intellectual resources, and a spirit of mutual understanding and collaborative innovation. It is designed for students who aspire to acquire well-rounded skills and broad intellectual perspectives that will enable them to thrive in workplaces where business success comes from personal and collaborative initiatives, a strong sense of trust and responsibility, open communication and active commitment to creative problem-solving as well as continuous improvement.

BPAcc

- BPAcc aims to equip graduates with the generic and technical attributes and competencies expected of professional accountants by accomplishing the following:

Generic Aspects

- (a) strengthen and improve intellectual qualities in language proficiency, IT proficiency, and analytical thinking and problem solving
- (b) develop commercial qualities such as commercial acumen, China focus, creativity and an orientation towards change
- (c) build personal qualities such as integrity, professionalism, drive, resilience, execution and a result orientation
- (d) enhance interpersonal qualities in terms of team leadership, communication and relationship building

Technical Aspects

- (e) broaden and strengthen foundation knowledge in accounting, economics, marketing, management, finance and statistics to further excel in a specialised field of study and/or a career
- (f) establish the basic and advanced knowledge required for admission to the examinations of professional accounting bodies, including the HKICPA, ACCA and CPA Australia

* Each course carries 3 credits, except for the *Capstone* and *Accounting Internship* courses which carry 6 credits each.

3.4 Graduation Requirements

- Students must obtain 120 credits of courses as prescribed in the curriculum, of which at least 63 credits should be at QF Level 5 and at least 30 credits from Major Core and Major Elective should be at QF Level 5.
- Students must complete a minimum of three semesters at the College, obtain Grade 'C-' or above in all core English courses and achieve a cGPA of 1.7 or above.

3.5 Admission Requirements

Year 1 Entry

- Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education (HKDSE) Examination
 - Level 3 or above in both English Language and Chinese Language; and
 - Level 2 or above in both Mathematics and Liberal Studies; and
 - Level 2 or above in one Elective subject.

- Non-local Qualifications
 - (i) International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma
 - IB Diploma with an overall score of 24 or above

 - (ii) General Certificate Education (GCE)
 - Grade E or above in GCE AS-Level in English Language; or equivalent; and
 - Grade E or above in GCE AS-Level in Chinese Language or another language subject, or equivalent; and
 - Grade E or above in 2 GCE A-Level subjects, or Grade E or above in 1 GCE A-Level subject plus Grade E or above in 2 AS-Level subjects.

 - (iii) International Advanced Level (IAL)
 - Grade E or above in IAL AS-Level in English Language, or equivalent; and
 - Grade E or above in IAL AS-Level in Chinese Language or another language subject, or equivalent; and
 - Grade E or above in 2 IAL A-Level subjects, or Grade E or above in 1 IAL A-Level subject plus Grade E or above in 2 AS-Level subjects.

 - (iv) Other Non-local Qualifications
 - Applicants with other non-local qualifications will be considered on the basis of individual merit. In general, applicants should have obtained a secondary / high school qualification equivalent to QF Level 3 and the commonly accepted minimum university entrance requirements in Hong Kong.
 - Applicants need to satisfy the English proficiency requirement obtaining at least

- an overall score of 6.0 in the International English Language Testing System (IELTS) with each component not less than 5.5, or
- a score of 550 in the paper-based Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL), or
- a score of 79 for the internet-based TOEFL with each component not less than 19.

Year 3 Entry

- Associate Degree (AD) / Higher Diploma (HD) holders or students holding equivalent qualifications can be admitted to Year 3 of the Programmes.
- A maximum transfer of credit will be imposed on applicants based on the Cumulative Grade Point Average (cGPA) in their AD/HD studies as follows:

2.00 or above	60 credits
1.90 - 1.99	54 credits
1.80 - 1.89	48 credits
1.79 or below	To be determined by individual course mapping and a minimum of grade C in each course will be required

- The College requires students admitted to Year 3 to take at least two Core Curriculum courses to enable comparable common learning experience with those of the Year 1 intakes. In addition, to ensure the adequacy of their prior knowledge to undertake the senior year studies, specific subject requirements are stipulated for each of the Majors as follows; otherwise, students are required to take relevant make-up courses:

BSocSc

- CGS Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *economics, sociology and political science*.
- SBPP Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *psychology, sociology and public administration*.
- STS Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *science and technology, economics, sociology and political science*.

BA

- (d) **LC Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *general linguistics/language studies, media and communication*.
- (e) **MCC Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *media, communication and cultural studies*.
- (f) **BMLA Major**
Applicants' prior learning should cover *marketing, economics, management and accounting*.

BPAcc

- (g) Applicants' prior learning should cover *basic accounting, economics, management, marketing, statistics, computer literacy and management accounting*.
