This accreditation report is issued by the Hong Kong Council for Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications (HKCAAVQ) in its capacity as the Accreditation Authority as provided for under the Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications Ordinance (Cap 592) (AAVQO). This report outlines the HKCAAVQ's determination, the validity period of the determination as well as any conditions or restrictions on the determination.

## 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The School of Continuing and Professional Education (SCOPE) at the City University of Hong Kong (CityU) was established as the Centre for Continuing Education in 1991 in CityU serving the lifelong learning needs of the community. SCOPE offers three major categories of programmes: programmes leading to non-local awards (foundation degree to doctoral level); programmes leading to continuing education awards; government-initiated programmes and short courses.
- 1.2 Sheffield Hallam University (SHU), previously the Sheffield City University, was granted university title and degree awarding power in 1992 in the United Kingdom (UK).
- 1.3 The accreditation exercise was conducted according to the relevant accreditation guidelines referred to in the Service Agreement and the Terms of Reference stated therein. A site visit took place on 1 and 2 February 2018.

## 2. HKCAAVQ's Accreditation Determination

Having due consideration of the accreditation panel's observations and comments as presented in this Report, HKCAAVQ makes the following accreditation determination:

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### 2.1.1 Recommendations

- (a) The Operator should conduct a survey to collect the views of the employers and graduates on graduate performance and programme effectiveness of the Programme after the graduation of the first cohort of the full degree programme and develop a marketing plan informed by their views to enhance its attractiveness to potential students.
- (b) The Operator should revisit and revise the POs and PILOs to clearly reflect the content of the Programme and ensure that it is fit for purpose in the Hong Kong market.
- (c) The Operator should provide up-to-date and relevant references in all module outlines in a standardised format and make them available on the VLE at least one week before the module commencement to facilitate effective learning of the students.
- (d) The Operator should develop a specific mechanism for moderating the marked assessments of the module *Work Placement* for consistent and fair assessment and to evaluate the module after its first operation for continuous improvement.
- (e) The Operator should produce a Dissertation Handbook detailing the specific requirements of a dissertation to ensure comparability between students and provide clear direction for supervisors and students.
- (f) The Operator should increase the involvement of SHU in the teaching activities of the Programme apart from monitoring the quality of the Programme delivered at SCOPE.

- (g) The Operator should strengthen their respective roles in managing the Programme and review the comprehensiveness of the annual programme review.

#### 3.1 Programme Objectives

PO1	To provide a sound applied knowledge in social science, with a particular focus on contemporary topics, concepts, and research
PO2	To develop a critical understanding of how governments and other agencies in a range of international settings respond to problems and issues
PO3	To develop skills in the application of social science theory and scholarly knowledge, including comparative analysis, to problems and issues
PO4	To encourage students' use of their previous academic study, and their own social and cultural experiences to inform their study at honours level
PO5	To provide an interesting, challenging and innovative learning experience which meets appropriate standards of quality
PO6	To help students to develop the key personal and transferable skills associated with their 'graduateness' and future employment in a rapidly changing environment
PO7	To provide a dynamic and supportive learning environment, which encourages graduates to operate autonomously as reflective and reflexive practitioners
PO8	To provide a suitable range of choices in the learning process allowing students to tailor their course for employment or further professional or postgraduate education

9.	the local, regional, international and supra-national dimensions of policy, especially social policy
10.	a range of sources of data and of the methods used to collect and analyse such data

Intellectual / Subject / Professional Key skills:

By the end of the programme, students will be able to:

1.	gather, retrieve, analyse, evaluate and synthesise information from a variety of sources
2.	identify, analyse, synthesise and evaluate arguments and research findings in a range of social science discipline areas
3.	present reasoned argument, and formulate and advocate solutions to social problems and issues in a variety of national and international contexts
4.	reflect on your own learning and seek to make use of constructive feedback for continuous intellectual development throughout your course of study
5.	manage your own learning self critically and exercise critical judgement

### 3.4 Graduation Requirements

- To graduate, students in the top-up programme are required to complete 180 credits including five core modules while students in the full degree programme are required to complete 360 credits including 13 core modules.

### 3.5 Admission Requirements

#### Year 1 Entry

- (a) Applicants obtaining total score of 15 or above in five HKDSE subjects, including English Language at Level 3 and no subject at Level 1; or
- (b) Applicants successfully completed the “Diploma in International Degree Foundation” offered by SCOPE; or
- (c) Equivalent qualifications.

#### Top-up entry

- (a) Graduates with an Associate Degree / Higher Diploma in Social Sciences or related disciplines

#### **4. Substantial Change**

- 4.1 HKCAAVQ may vary or withdraw the Accreditation Report if it is satisfied that any of the grounds set out in section 5 (2) of the AAVQO apply. This includes where HKCAAVQ is satisfied that the Operator is no longer competent to achieve the relevant objectives and/or the Programme no longer meets the standard to achieve the relevant objectives as claimed by the Operator (whether by reference to the Operator's failure to fulfil any conditions and/or comply with any restrictions stipulated in this Accreditation Report or otherwise) or where at any time during the validity period there has/have been substantial change(s) introduced by the Operator after HKCAAVQ has issued the accreditation report(s) to the Operator and which has/have not been approved by HKCAAVQ.
